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I have been asked to explain what Epiphany is in the church year, and what Epiphany celebrates. The word itself is not strictly religious. When someone has a sudden insight and grasps the essential meaning of something we say they had an epiphany. It usually happens in response to an event. For example, I narrowly escaped death from heart attack in 2006. Sitting alone in a room at Cleveland Clinic, looking out over the city, I realized I needed to reprioritize things and make some serious changes in my life.

That's an epiphany. The Epiphany refers to events in the life of Jesus that revealed him to be the Messiah Israel was waiting for, and also that he is God's promised savior for the whole world, including us Gentiles. One event in particular fits that definitionthe coming of the Gentile Magi to worship the new-born King. There are other events during Jesus' life and ministry that do the same thing, but this is the first, and probably the most dramatic.

Here is how the Epiphany fits into the church year that developed over the first three-plus centuries after the birth of Jesus Christ. The year is divided into two half-years: 1) the half year of our Lord and 2) the half year of the Church. The first half year begins with Advent-Christmas. Advent is the four Sundays leading up to December 25, and is a time of preparation for his coming to us in Bethlehem-the incarnation, God becomming one of us. Christmas, obviously, is that coming, and consists of twelve days, counting Christmas Day. The next great event is Christ's manifestation as Son of God, King of kings-the Epiphany, January 6. Epiphany season continues until Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, the forty-day season in which we remember Christ's suffering and death on our behalf. Then comes Easter, the celebration of his victory over death and darkness.

The half year of the Church begins fifty days after the resurrection, on the Day of Pentecost, when God sends the Holy Spirit to empower believers, building Christian character in them, and reaching the world with Good News through them.

So in our worship and teaching we tell the story of God's love and grace in Jesus Christ as we live through the themes of the church year.
